A rare Chinese pocket sundial in white metal, champlévé enamel, paste and brass, with original silk lined box.

A small number of these rare and unusual devices are recorded and this is a particularly fine example in good condition.

In the early 19th century in Canton there was a small market for clever items such as clocks, watches, automata and scientific instruments, which were popular with the Chinese Imperial court as well as with

Europeans. This item must have been made in the same Imperial workshops.
